This is a potluck meal so everybody needs to bring something to share. The church will provide the meat and drinks - you fill in the rest: vegetables, salads or desserts!



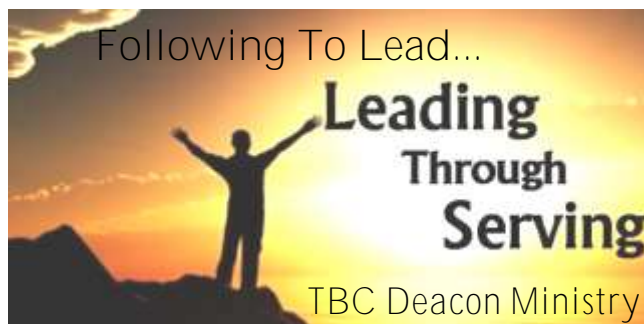

Organizers originally intended that the day would be filled with a street parade to allow the public to appreciate the work of the trade and labor organizations. The Children’s Department is back in full swing following the summer vacation. August 15 was our first Wednesday and we had 138 children. We are averaging about 125 every Wednesday. We are still in need of volunteers to help! Vans begin to arrive at 3:30, supper is served at 5:00, and it is usually 8:30-8:45 when the last van departs. We could use people to help with all aspects of our Wednesday program. Sunday morning we average about 55 youth and children. We need help in the Preschool area with the 3-4 year old and kindergarten children. The good news is that we have several new children in the preschool area but we need helpers

to assist the teachers. We also need helpers to be “on call” when and if we have a vacancy because of illness, travel, or vacations. This would require your help on occasion. I could refer to this list in the event we had a vacancy. Please pray about your willingness to help in the Children’s Department. Let me know if you feel that you would be interested. You will definitely receive blessings by working with the TBC kids.

Our next event is the Annual Fall Festival, Wednesday, Oct. 31. We will need lots of candy as this is also Halloween night. We expect a record number of TBC and community children to attend the festival. Please leave candy at the atrium desk or at my office in the preschool area. Eventually we will ask for baked items for the cake walk; which is the most popular booth at the festival. If you would

like to be involved by working a booth please let me know.

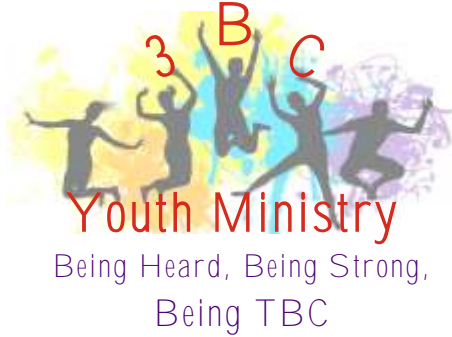
The children will be performing their Christmas music at the White Christmas Service on December 9.

1. Make certain that the information you want to share is also available to people through other means. In other words, don't count on an announcement in church on Sunday to reach everyone that needs reaching. Consider also using the Courier, classroom announcements, and

mailed reminders to get your message out.

2. If you'd like me to make an announcement for you in church, consider writing it out on a piece of paper or emailing it to me. I can usually remember things people want me to announce, but not always. If I have it printed out, I'll be much more likely to get it right.
