FROM THE PASTOR

Stewardship season is always an uncomfortable time in the church. It forces us to talk about (ick) unspiritual things like money, and giving, and budgets. Wouldn't Jesus prefer that we discuss healing and serving and loving our neighbors as ourselves?

After all, Jesus healed the man born blind, fed the five thousand, and told us that "Nobody wants to pay for the copier contract."

the test of discipleship is to love as God has loved us. So yes, in the world of the Bible, that's exactly what we're called to do.

But I think it's a false dichotomy to assume that Jesus was all about ministry, and stewardship is all about money. Because while we'd like to think that Jesus whipped up those miracles out of nothing, the reality is that someone had to come up with the funds to carry out his mission.

At the end of Mark 15, in between stories about the crucifixion and the resurrection, the gospel writer mentions that among those watching at Golgotha were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. Verse 41 explains: "These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee."

In other words, even Jesus needed people who would support his ministry, and the same holds true today.

But in 2018 dollars, feeding those 5000 people would have run Jesus something like \$15,000. Our Welcome Table estimates that we feed between 250 and 300 people, 52 weeks out of the year. Sometimes donations offset the cost of that, but Chef Amelia tells me that we need to plan on \$3 each for those (approximately) 15,000 meals. That's \$45,000 per year.

In Luke's gospel, the Good Samaritan binds up the wounds of the traveler on the road to Jericho, and puts him up in an inn until he is well enough to resume his journey. For the sake of argument, let's assume that's 5 days. Here in Blount County, five days of lodging would run at least \$200. One of NPPC's budget commitments is to support the work of Good Neighbors,

which is sometimes called upon to provide emergency help for families or individuals experiencing homelessness.

Given the explosion of health care costs, I won't dare to estimate what restoring sight to a blind person might

Truth be told, that is "easy money" to raise. Everyone likes to feed the hungry and heal the sick and house the homeless. No one

minds having their charitable donations support those ministries.

But as a friend of mine says, "Nobody wants to pay for the copier contract." It's hard to get excited about giving money to the church for the light bill, or FICA matching for employees, or batteries for wireless microphones.

There are also other "hidden" expenses. We are able to offer a ministry like the Welcome Table in large part because a decade ago, New Providence broke ground on an ambitious building project that included gathering space to seat 500+people. At that time, we hadn't even begun to comprehend the need in this community for that ministry, but clearly the Spirit was leading us in the right direction.

Our building is open 5 days a week, providing space for Scout troops, community agencies and ministry partners to carry out their own important missions, not to mention NPPC's own programs and outreach ministries.

Oddly enough, that all makes me think of Charles Blackburn: Charles was (literally) a lifelong member of this church. He was baptized and confirmed at NPPC, and when he died almost a year ago, he had been a member for 74 years.

Last May, when I met with Liz and her family to plan Charles' memorial service, she said something that resonated with me deeply. She said that Charlie Blackburn supported New Providence financially because he always wanted us to have enough money to keep the church running and the campus in shape.

Other people may be concerned

that our outreach, educational, and worship ministries are well-funded, and there's nothing at all wrong with that. But Charlie is the guy who worried about the building. He wanted to be sure there was enough to cover the light bill and maintain the facilities in good working order.

In other words, Charles Blackburn wanted to be sure the copier contract was paid.

A year or so ago, I shared a stewardship prayer with you that was written by the pastor of the Foundry United Methodist Church in Washington, DC. In it, Dean Snyder said that just once, he'd like to hear an offering prayer that sounds something like this: "We offer to you, O God, this money and rejoice in all it will buy and pay for. We thank you that some of it will pay for salad dressing from Costco to feed hungry people. A portion will build a well to provide safe drinking water in Haiti. A few dollars will pay for the worksheets our children carry home after Sunday school. May what they learn here help shape their character and life values.

"Some of this offering will buy sheet music for the choir so that your name might be glorified. Some will pay the electricity and heat for this building where we come to worship you, where victims of domestic violence come for support, and where NA groups meet to help each other stay sober.

"We thank you that this offering will pay for the pastors' salaries and the salaries of the church staff who devote themselves to organizing this congregation to make disciples of Jesus to transform the world. May their work be wise and courageous. And a small portion of this money will help pay our [General Presbyter's] salary and support the work of our [presbytery]. We pray that through all this, we might make a difference in our particular corner of the world."

And then he finishes with these words: "We also remember that some of us who have given the fewest dollars have been the most generous, and some of us who have given more dollars have not given as sacrificially. Still we rejoice in this money we present to you, God. We delight in it. We delight in what it will buy and what it will not buy because we didn't keep it for ourselves.

We love giving you this money, God. Thank you that the Word became flesh and began this earthly Christian movement of love, inclusion, justice, beauty and joy so that we might give our dollars to help fuel it. In gratitude for the blessing of being able to give our money, we pray..."

And to that, the preacher says, "Amen."

It is a joy to be the church with you!

GROWING IN FAITH TOGETHER

The pie chart represents the entire 2017-2018 budget. Each piece of the pie correlates to a specific ministry (or category of ministries). We hope this will help you see how our resources are allocated to operate a successful ministry.

Our local community and our church are blessed, by anyone's standards. Pledged giving is a way of returning a portion of our gifts to God. Growing In Faith Together is represented by a living tree with many branches, which symbolizes the part that each of us play in the life of our church.
